First Expansion Phase Nearly Complete

As the first phase of a long-term, multi-million dollar expansion and building program nears completion at UPMC Passavant Hospital, officials there are optimistic about the health facility's future prospects.

"Consistent with our historic mission," said hospital spokesman Robert Henderson, "is the provision of high quality, cost effective and accessible services to meet the community's total health needs. Though the health care environment continues to change, the first phase of our expansion will allow us to advance our mission in the most efficient way."

The first phase of new development at UPMC Passavant received all the necessary municipal approvals, and it includes a three-story, 45,000 square-foot patient wing that is being added on top of the hospital's East Wing. This new facility will house patient beds for progressive and surgical

care, and it is expected to be completed by early next year.

The expansion plans also include a multi-purpose office building that will house UPMC Health System's corporate services. This project currently is in the design phase.

A new 100-unit assisted living facility was completed this past January, and it has begun providing services, such as personal care, housekeeping, meals and 24-hour oversight for the elderly.

New Road

In conjunction with this first phase, UPMC Passavant expects to build a road that will serve as a continuation of Cumberland Road intersecting to Peebles Road, thereby providing improved access for the residents of Allison Park and adjacent communities. It is expected that emergency vehicles also will realize greater response times with the new route. Plans for the road will meet all

PennDOT and Town specifications, and it will include a new traffic signal where Cumberland Road will meet Sample Road at Peebles.

World-Class Focus

No new beds have been added to the hospital's 272 acute-care beds or the 24-bed Subacute Care Unit. Patient units in the existing building will be moved to the new addition, and the existing building soon will become an outpatient pavilion.

Hospital officials expressed a desire for North Hills patients to go no further than Babcock Boulevard for world-class medical care and housing for senior citizens. The completion of this first phase will enable residents to take advantage of the latest medical treatments and technology close to home.

UPMC Passavant is the largest employer in northern Allegheny County. It was founded in 1846 as the Pittsburgh Infirmary by Willam Alfred Passavant. By 1849, it was known as Passavant Hospital, and it was the first Protestant hospital built in the United States.

In 1964, it moved from the City of Pittsburgh to its present location, where it serves the communities of northern Allegheny and southern Butler Counties.

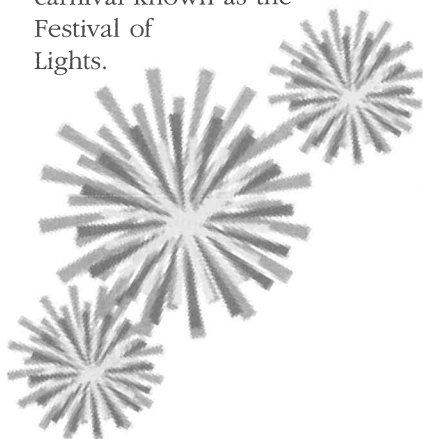

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DOG OWNERS: BE AWARE!



Residents who have failed to purchase a yearly **COUNTY** license(s) for their dog(s) three months of age or older are violating Pennsylvania law. **FINE: \$300 FOR EACH UNLICENSED DOG.** The State Dog Law requires owners to obtain dog licenses by January 1st of each year. License applications are available through the County Treasurer's Office, Borough or Township buildings and can be mailed to the address on the application below.

James A. Brush, State Dog Warden for the Bureau of Dog Law Enforcement, has indicated that he and his colleagues intend to canvass the area during the next several months. Owners of any unlicensed dog will be prosecuted.

While conducting their license canvasses, the wardens also will check to see that all dogs and cats three months of age or older have been vaccinated against rabies.

Violations of the Commonwealth's rabies or registration requirements can result in fines up to \$300 *per day* for each unlicensed dog or non-vaccinated animal.

As a convenience to residents, we are providing a copy of the Dog License Application. Lifetime permits are available for dogs that are permanently marked. Lifetime permit fees for senior citizens and the disabled are: \$21 for neutered/spayed dogs, \$31 for all other dogs. The lifetime permit fee is otherwise \$31 for neutered/spayed dogs, and \$51 for all other dogs. After receiving a license number from the County Treasurer's Office, the owner is required to have the number tattooed on their dog before obtaining the lifetime license.

1999 Council Minutes

Police Appointments - February 22, 1999

During Council's Regular Business Meeting, five officers received promotions. They were:

Sgt. Steven E. Reid to Lieutenant; Reid had been a sergeant since 1987. One of his key responsibilities was to oversee the communications center, which is now under the auspices of the 9-1-1 service. As Lieutenant, he will act as Operations Supervisor.

Officer Donald J. O'Connor to Sergeant; O'Connor joined the force in 1988 and served most recently as detective and youth aid officer.

Officer Bryan B. Madden to Sergeant; Madden is in his sixth year on the Town's police force, and he also served in the Sheriffs Department of Polk County, Florida.

Officer Thomas E. Niebel to Sergeant; Niebel is an 18-year veteran of the McCandless police force. In 1997, Niebel was commended by the North Hills Boroughs and Townships Police Association and Town Council for saving a young man from drowning in Pine Creek, below North Park Lake.

Officer David R. DiSanti to Sergeant; DiSanti is a graduate of the FBI National Academy and has an associate's degree in Criminology from Indiana University of Pennsylvania. He has been a patrolman since 1979 and a detective since 1990.

All appointments became effective immediately.

Local Taxpayers Bill of Rights Public Hearing - February 22, 1999

A motion was passed unanimously during Council's Regular Business Meeting of March 22, 1999 to adopt a Local Taxpayers Bill of Rights

required by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. This ordinance provides for procedures in billing and collection of taxes to ensure taxpayers are given fair treatment in the event of a dispute.

Many of the provisions and processes within the newly adopted Bill of Rights have been used by the Town Of McCandless over the years, but now there will be some standardization of them throughout the state.

Part of the Bill of Rights provides for a hearing officer to review cases on an informal basis, and Town has engaged an independent public accountant to act as the hearing officer.

Councilman Mohr commented that this Bill of Rights may codify what the Town has been doing for a long time, even before it was mandated by the state.

Resolution - March 22, 1999 Thank you, Edyie

Council adopted a resolution commending Edith M. Liguori for her work ethic and dedication during her 30 years of outstanding public service to the Town of McCandless.

Edith served the Town as an Administrative Assistant, and for the last 15 years in the key role of Assistant Manager and Tax Collector. The Town will miss her.

Zoning Committee Personnel Changes - March 22, 1999

Motions were passed to accept the resignations of Nancy Palmer and Derek B. Tatlock from the McCandless Zoning Hearing Board and appoint Alan T. Shuckrow to Palmer's unexpired term and James P. Childress to Tatlock's unexpired term, both of which end December 31, 2000.

Resolutions also were adopted appointing both Blaine A. Lamperski and Nancy Palmer as alternates to the Zoning Hearing Board.

A motion also passed to appoint Peter A. Dickinson, M.D. to the unexpired term of Gerard F. Hickel as a board member of the McCandless Franklin Park Ambulance Authority. The term ends December 31, 2000.

Public Safety Committee Meeting - April 5, 1999

Revised plans for modifications to the Police Department entrance area were reviewed and approved. Since the 9-1-1 dispatch center is now located at another site, there may be no personnel available at the department entrance during evening hours of the second and third shift.

A secure, safe haven area will, however, be constructed to accommodate those in need during these hours. Emergency telephone service will be available at the site.

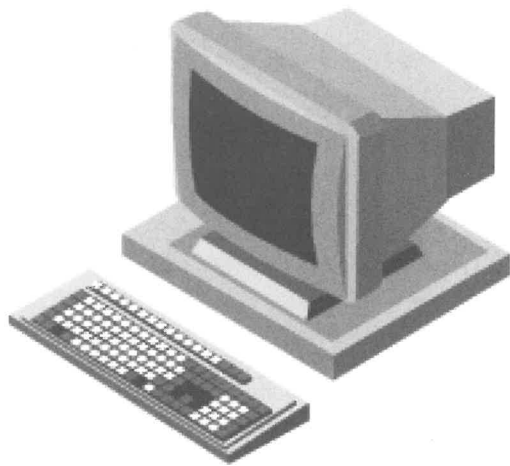
Recreation Committee - April 26, 1999

A resolution was adopted authorizing the Council President and the Town Manager to sign an agreement with Allegheny County for a five-year lease for use by the Town of the Lakeview Grove ball field.

Adult Entertainment Ordinance - May 24, 1999

A motion was passed amending the Planning and Zoning Code by regulating the time, manner and place of sexually-oriented business operations and for the provisions of fees, inspections, limitations, regulations of permits, penalties and other remedies for violation of the ordinance.

Y2K Update



The original developers of our modern day computers failed to think far enough ahead toward the turn of the century. Much like the rest of us, specific dates were written and are currently installed in code. For instance, January 1, 2000 will be coded as 010100

Humans the world over will understand that we have entered a new millenium, but computers will read their old antiquated programs and determine that the date (010100) is the beginning of the 1900s all over again. Some experts call this the Millenium Bug.

But not to worry. The Town of McCandless is on top of the problem, and the Millenium Bug is on its way to becoming completely eradicated at Town Hall.

In the first phase, the Town administrative staff assisted in identifying all electronic systems that may be threatened by the Bug.

Second, a consultant recommended the type of new computer equipment, both hardware and software, that the Town needed to avoid the Y2K problems. That equipment already has been installed.

Last but not least comes the testing phase. Town officials and staff are undergoing a rigorous testing exercise that is putting the new system through its paces. If the new system performs as expected in service to its residents, McCandless effectively will have squashed the Millenium Bug

Department Reports - May 3, 1999

Chief of Police Gary Anderson said that new records management software will be installed in August. A letter is on file to the effect that the new hardware is Y2K compliant.

The Chief also stated that he believes the personal computers in the department are in compliance, and that they will be tested in the near future. The department's hand-held radios and cellular phones are not time- or date-sensitive. All other operating software is Y2K compliant and will be backed up by year's end.

Fire Marshall Dan Stack reported that progress also is being made working in conjunction with the fire departments. Meters, pumps and other equipment either are on file as being compliant or are not time- and date-sensitive.

Assistant Town Manager Rege Ebner reported that the Town's auditors have agreed to test the administrative office systems and provide information and guidelines to make it fully compliant

Town Manager Toby Cordek said that if the Town finds that it has several computers that do not have Windows 98 or other Y2K compliant software, it will either upgrade the software or replace the computers.

Town officials expect no catastrophes along the lines of what some doomsayers predict. Services provided by the Town are right on track to be delivered with no interference expected.

However, should there be minor interruptions (those that do not jeopardize life, health and safety), the Town's administration urges restraint, patience and common sense. Working together and making sensible preparations, the residents of the Town of McCandless will enjoy a new millenium without incident.

Deer Herd Thinning Program Continues

The ongoing deer population control program undertaken for selected portions of the Town of McCandless and North Park continues to be quite effective, as numerous residents and park users have expressed support.

Deer herd thinning is important to the residents in the area from the standpoint of disease control, property damage and ecosystem management.

This year the program will be managed by Suburban Whitetail Management Associates. At the close of the fourth and final season, hunters will continue to ensure that the grounds are policed, and they will provide a final tally report of the entire harvest program.

Watch for information again this year, regarding dates and times for the program to begin and end.

Step Up to the Challenge

Fact: the three fire companies that serve the Town of McCandless including the Highland, the Peebles District and Ingomar Fire Departments, are completely staffed by volunteers.

Fact: the number of McCandless fire alarms have increased each year over the past five years.

Fact: new fire service volunteers have decreased over the same period.

Even though creating a new generation of volunteers is a difficult proposition, it is not insurmountable.

"Project 'Step Up' continues to make progress," said McCandless Fire Marshall Dan Stack. We have been able to recruit a number of individuals who are interested in serving the community, but volunteers are still in short supply."

Mr. Stack and the fire departments that serve the Town of McCandless are urging residents -- both firefighters and non-firefighters -- to step up and create a new generation of fire service volunteers.



Those that wish to volunteer for responding to emergency calls will be asked to undergo 120 hours of formal training at the Allegheny County Fire Training Academy in North Park. Volunteers also are required to respond to emergencies around the clock and to be present at two hours of training a week.

Non-firefighting volunteers are needed as well, and their duties can involve anything from typing, filing and balancing the checkbook to cleaning, organizing events, babysitting and cutting the grass. The departments also could use legal, printing and equipment repair services.

The Town's fire officials urge everyone to step up. Get involved. And be rewarded in the knowledge that you will be part of an elite crew that provides a vital service to the Town and its residents.

The heat is on, but every rung on the fire ladder is a "step up."

Ingomar Road/Harmony Road Traffic Signal Project

This project currently is under design by the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation and is being reviewed by Town staff and engineers. Existing utilities will make the installation of the signal difficult, but hopefully its presence will regulate the flow of traffic in an improved manner through the Ingomar area. Actual installation of the signal will be timed with the use of budgeted local funds and possible state resources.

Planning a Deck?

Summer is the time when many attempt to realize their dream of that add-on backyard deck.

But Town Building Official Bruce Betty suggests that residents check first to determine if the deck plans conform with zoning requirements.

"There are a number of details to consider," said Mr. Betty, "especially when it comes to side and front yard set-backs. These ordinances vary according to the zoning district in which a property lies, and they also can vary with respect to the size of the house and number of stories."

Mr. Betty explains that plans for decks should be approved by the Building Department to ensure that they also conform to building code requirements, such as the type of materials to be used and the weight or live load per square foot.

Underground Sprinklers and Rights of Way

The popularity of underground sprinkler systems for lawns and gardens is growing. But oftentimes it is difficult to determine the boundaries between private and public property.

So it is becoming increasingly important to check with Planning and Land Use Administrator Bruce Betty before installing the system. He can help ensure that a sprinkler does not encroach on public rights of way.

An underground watering system that has been installed without careful planning could be at risk, if work needs to be performed on adjacent public property.

House Numbers

Because the Town of McCandless is participating in Allegheny County's enhanced 9-1-1 program, it has become critical for emergency response teams to identify and locate individuals by their house numbers.

An ordinance enacted by the Town states that owners of buildings or property within the Town must have these numbers displayed properly.

In some cases, if the house numbers are concealed by trees or other man-made obstacles, then addresses must be posted within 20 feet of roadway.

Residents are urged to choose simple, readable numerals in highly

contrasting colors, such as dark numerals on light backgrounds or light numerals on dark backgrounds. Avoid ornate or decorative numerals or color combinations that do not provide sufficient contrast.

Addresses displayed on a house must be in close proximity to the door, and

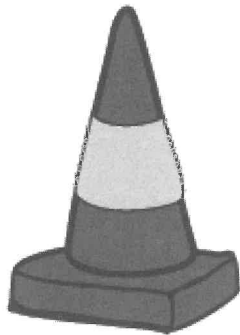


it may be a good idea to add lighting in order to aid quick identification in emergency situations after dusk.
